

Building a STER SUPPLY KIT

WATER/FOOD/MISC.

WATER

- ☐ At least one gallon per person per day for drinking, cooking, and hygiene. Aim for a three-day supply for evacuation and a two-week supply for staying at home.
- ☐ Refillable water bottle

FOOD

- ☐ Non-perishable, easy-to-prepare items like canned goods, energy bars, peanut butter, and dried fruits.
- ☐ Baby formula & baby food.
- ☐ Don't forget about the pets: food, bowls, leashes, and any medication
- ☐ Aim for a three-day supply for evacuation and a two-week supply for staying at home.

MISCELLANEOUS

- ☐ Manual can opener
- ☐ External harddrive/thumb drive: consider having photos and important documents backed up onto a harddrive or thumb drive
- ☐ A deck of playing cards / games
- ☐ Blank pad of paper and pencil(s)
- ☐ Two-way radios
- ☐ Extra set of car & house keys

FIRST AID & HYGIENE

WOUND CARE

- ☐ Antiseptic wipes or alcohol pads
- ☐ Sterile bandages, gauze pads & medical tape (various sizes)
- ☐ Antibiotic & burn ointments
- ☐ Gloves (latex-free)

PERSONAL SANITATION

- ☐ Soap and hand sanitizer
- ☐ Toothbrush and toothpaste
- ☐ Toilet paper
- ☐ Moist towelettes (baby wipes)
- ☐ Feminine hygiene products

MEDS / OTHER

- ☐ Prescription meds & equipment (hearing aids, glasses, contact lenses, extra batteries, etc.)
- ☐ Antihistamines (for allergies)
- ☐ Pain relievers (aspirin/ibuprofen)
- ☐ Tweezers
- □ Scissors
- ☐ Eye wash solution
- ☐ Breathing barrier (with one-way valve)
- ☐ Instant cold compress
- ☐ Lip balm
- ☐ Hair ties

SAFETY & TOOLS

LIGHTING & COMMUNICATION

- ☐ Small flashlight (extra batteries)
- ☐ Battery-powered or hand-crank radio (preferably a NOAA weather radio for updates)
- ☐ Cell phone with charger
- ☐ Map(s) for navigation local, county, and state; consider highlighting any necessary planned routes
- □ Compass
- ☐ Matches / lighter / fire starter
- ☐ Reflective triangles / Road flares

REPAIRS & TASKS

- Whistle
- ☐ Duct tape
- ☐ Dust Mask
- \square Quality Mutli-tool / pocket knife
- Work gloves

COMFORT & WARMTH

- ☐ Blankets or sleeping bags
- ☐ Emergency blanket
- ☐ Extra Clothing (one change/person)
- ☐ Water-proof wind beaker & polypropylene fleece
- ☐ Sturdy Shoes (think closed toed)
- ☐ Garbage bags and plastic ties

IMPORTANT DOCS

IDENTIFICATION

- ☐ Marriage & birth certificates
- Passports
- ☐ Social security cards
- ☐ Military service documents
- ☐ Pet vaccination records

FINANCIAL / LEGAL RECORDS

- ☐ Insurance policies
- ☐ Tax return
- ☐ Property deed(s) + Mortgage statement OR Lease agreement
- ☐ Wills/Trusts/Estate Plans
- ☐ Vehicle title and registrations
- ☐ Bank & credit card statements
- ☐ Investment records
- ☐ Debit/credit card
- \square \$100 \$500 in small bills

MEDICAL INFORMATION

- ☐ Health insurance cards
- ☐ Prescriptions with dosages
- ☐ Immunization/Medical records
